The first regular Borough Council Workshop for the month of May 2010 of the Somerville Borough Council was convened on Monday, May 3, 2010 at 7:05 pm prevailing time, in Borough Council Chambers, 24 South Bridge Street, Somerville, New Jersey.

### **2010 Somerville Board of Education Budget**

Mayor Gallagher opened the discussion with the following remarks:

On Tuesday, April 20 voters went to the polls to cast their vote for the Somerville Board of Education budget. The budget vote was 645 votes against the proposed budget, and 548 votes for the budget...a difference of 67 votes that triggers a process of review and recommendation by the Borough Council back to the Board of Education. Compliant with state law, the Board of Education had 48 hours from election certification to supply the Borough with their background budget information. The Board was prompt in their supply of that information.

The Borough Council now has until May 19 to advise the Board of Education as to their recommendation regarding the budget. The Borough council can do one of the following...

1. We can decide that the overall budget presented to the public was warranted and needed, and confirm to the Board that the total should be reinstated.
2. We can suggest recommended budget cuts to the Board of Education which the Board of Ed can either agree with or revise, so long as the dollar value is the same as what the Council determined is the necessary budget reduction. The Board then can either implement that decision, or appeal that decision back to the State for their review.

This is an awful process that rips communities apart, creates animosity between residents, Boards, councils, teachers and even students...but it is the process we have....sitting up here I have been through this twice before and it is not pleasant for anyone but one which we need to do....for some \$1 is too large of a cut and for others \$1 million is not enough...so no matter the outcome, there will be folks angry at any decision made.....however we will get through this and no matter the outcome, continue on with the wonderful work that our community deserves.

Here is the manner in which we will take this issue up tonight...I would like to hear from the public before council begins deliberations... you will be given the opportunity and respect you deserve and I ask for that same respect in response for all the parties involved in this process. This is not a debate, but an opportunity to express your opinion on a very important issue. Please keep your statements concise....state your name and address for the record and address your comments to me....public comment is now open.....

Peter Lawton, President of the Board of Education made some opening comments. He understands that the Borough Council is faced with the need to balance the needs of the entire community this evening. This is the budget which is being considered this evening. The Board of Education budgets for two years in advance.

Dr. Carolyn Leary presented her opening comments regarding the defeated 2010 budget. She made reference to the comments made by the Mayor earlier "regardless of what the cuts are Somerville will continue the wonderful work they have done.

Mayor Gallagher clarified his comments to be regardless of the outcome this evening.

Dr. Leary commented that there was a \$1.9 million dollar cut in state aid earlier this year. This was done as a result of the recent savings that the Borough has been able to make over the years.

On March 17, 2010, the Board of Education received word that it would be losing 5% less or another \$1.9 million dollar cut.

On March 23, 2010, Governor Christie came to Somerville to see the acute way they can manage an award winning school system on such a conservative shoestring budget.

Dr. Leary stated that there is a major decision to make here this evening. Do you take a step backwards and remove dollars and brick by brick the school district that has been built up over the past number of years.

At this time Mayor Gallagher opened the meeting to comments from the public.

John Kurilla, 77 Eastern Ave, Somerville, asked if the Council was going to by-pass the vote of the people and approve the budget.

Mayor Gallagher replied that this is what the purpose of this evening's discussion is for. The Borough Council will weigh the comments and make a decision regarding the budget.

Dennis Garrot, Somerville Board of Education, commented on the recent meeting with Governor Christie and they were impressed with how Somerville manages their budget. The money taken was to off-set the rest of the deficit in the state. A total of \$ 3.8 million was taken from the school system. He asked that the Borough Council look at this decision as a non-political decision.

Patrick Mulrooney, 7 Robin Rd, Somerville, commented that he pays \$8,000 in property taxes. There needs to be a limit to this. Everything is going up and the income is stabilizing. He asks the council to look at this very closely. He was also concerned with the recently installation of the bricks and columns on West High Street.

Jocelyn Ekhart, 195 Cornell Blvd, she has lived in Somerville for twenty-seven years and all of her children all attended the Somerville Public Schools. She has taught in Somerville for many years. She is paying 25% in her income to Somerville taxes. She commented that her education is the most valuable asset you can have.

Carol Kohurt, 964 Glenn Ave, North Brunswick. She has worked for the Somerville school system for the past thirty-three years. This discussion this evening should be about values and what is provided to the community of Somerville. It is important that the children receive what they need to get into the next century.

Irene Barrett, 51 Fieldstone Dr, Somerville, has lived here for the past twenty-seven years. Her children have also gone through the school system and has had a great experience. She has recently seen a program on how desirable it is to live in Somerville. She hopes that the Council considers this in their decision this evening.

Mayor Gallagher asked for any further comments and hearing none he closed the public portion of the meeting.

Mayor Gallagher provided the following additional comments:

When seated at this table there are some issues that come before us which are extremely difficult...this is one of them. We sat here a few short weeks ago and I pointed out that we have some of the best schools in this nation...our schools have been recognized on a state and national level which few can claim. That success is due to a number of factors...our teachers which are tops by any measurement, the faculty and administration, the facilities, our kids and the parents in our community. All have made significant investments and sacrifices to ensure our kids have the best, I know for a fact of the level of not only professional commitment but personal commitment that each teacher, and administrator has for our children and this community. In return, our community has supported the schools through thick and thin so we could afford to hire the best, to build the best and to be the best....it is part of what makes our community great.

Come this fall I will have 5 children in the Somerville Public school system..3 in high school, 1 in Middle school and one in kindergarten...I have a great concern on both a personal and community level that our schools maintain their wonderful distinction...and no matter the outcome today, I know they will continue on that track.

As a parent I supported this budget...as your Mayor I have to respect the voter.

Government and education are changing rapidly..not because we want it to, but it has to today..like it or not. The discussion we have here today is not about the Governor, it is not about union vs. management, it is not about Board of Ed versus Borough Council, it is about the taxpayers ability to pay here in Somerville....nothing more, nothing less.

When contracts are crafted, they are based on projections given the time at hand...we have never seen times like this before, they are unprecedented, and in turn decisions like never before must be made...it requires a give and take by everyone and the realization that we are all in this together. If not, it will create alienation, anger, finger pointing and blame.

Unemployment in Somerset County has more than doubled in 2 years from 3% to 7%, in Somerville; there have been 14 full time and 3 part time Borough employees layed off. We have negotiated the following raises for next year...

Public Works Union—0%, Administrative Union—0%, Non Union Administrative staff—0%

..and I have asked for and received a 5% reduction in contractual cost from our professional service contractors effective May1..these are legally binding contract rates which the Borough had agreed to but because of the economic times we are in, when I asked them to reduce their fees, each agreed to do their part to help ride the tough times through. The list goes on and on....

Do our teachers in Somerville deserve a raise...as far as I am concerned unequivocally yes....however the taxpayers, not the council, not the board of education but the taxpayer has said, we need to take a breath, we

need to take stock for a moment and we are asking that a raise be put off this year to enable us to keep all of the programs we have, to keep the standards we have and to keep the teaching staff at the same level...

How can we justify pay freezes across the board within the Borough, and at the same time condone this increase ...as a Mayor I cannot.

I thought the perfect solution was to put on the table the idea that if there was a pay freeze agreed to, the Borough Council would reduce the budget by that same amount...a pay freeze equals \$700,000. I also offered the idea that the 1.5% benefit issue would be off the table...that value is approximately \$300,000. Most everyone I spoke with thought this was a great approach including the Council. My understanding is that this is not an option the Union wishes to consider in opening their contract to renegotiate...and it is my firm belief that these are marching orders from Trenton leadership and not the will of the affected employees.

Most are here tonight because they feel that this responsibility lies solely with the Borough Council now, I say that is incorrect. I say the impact on any budget reduction the Borough Council may make lies squarely with Trenton Union leadership and the ability of this local to do what is right collectively to further the prospect of education in our Borough. Any cuts that are made tonight can be offset by a wage freeze for next year eliminating the need for further reductions....a very simple solution for a complex problem and a solution that many public and private employees are accepting all over this state.

For many years the people of Somerville have invested and tried to provide the best for their children...the best teachers, the best facilities, and each time asked the people of Somerville rose to the occasion and said yes we believe in our schools....we still believe in our schools but this time the taxpayer is asking...we have stepped up and helped where we can...can you step forward and help us.

Mayor Gallagher opened the meeting to comments from the Borough Council.

Councilman Sullivan commented that he has been here for fifteen years and this year is one of the most difficult times in the Borough of Somerville. There is a strong commitment from the community to the school system. There is a need to respect the will of the people. He asked the board to prepare various scenarios. The top cut would be \$700,000 and he would not support a cut that extreme.

Councilman Mitchell commented that he does not want to cut any person or program. As finance vice-chair he has been required to make cuts. He has heard people discuss fixed income and this is an issue. People in New Jersey are losing income and are faced with taking jobs with lower income. To simply have a job in this current economy in a good thing. He would hope that if there are cuts made he would hope that the educators of Somerville also agree to a freeze in order to maintain their current positions.

Councilman Wilson outlined the reduction scenarios that have been presented. The first option would be a zero cut to the current budget. The second scenario would be a \$410,000 reduction with a tax increase of \$129.82. The third scenario would be a cut of \$576,022.00 with an average tax increase of \$111.91. The final scenario would be \$690,464,000 with an average increase of \$98.40. There are some personal stories this evening of people losing their jobs and their homes. He feels that there needs to be a reduction and it must be substantial. We cannot have a healthy town without healthy schools. He is willing to cut the budget at \$575,000.

Councilman Utter commented that the budget was defeated by 67 votes and the turnout was a lot larger than usual. The 67 votes is very significant. The voters are saying to do more with less. There have been cuts coming to Somerville from Trenton and there were also layoffs. He would like to go with the pay freeze recommendation.

Councilwoman Kobuta commented that her husband was a former school music teacher. After moving to Somerville and purchasing a home they learned that one of his 2 ½ day teaching positions was cut. She had wished that the teachers that had to options back then to take a salary freeze in order to save his job. At her husband's funeral students came from all around and praised him as a teacher. She is very unhappy to hear that the teachers are not considering a wage freeze. She is recommending the \$575,000 reduction.

Councilman Sullivan made a motion to recommend a cut of \$500,000 to the school board budget. The motion was seconded by Councilwoman Kobuta.

Councilman Mitchell commented that he would still like to see a larger cut made. He would like to see at least \$576,000 cut from the budget.

The motion was called for a vote and approved by the following vote:

Mayor Gallagher thanked everyone for attending this evening. He understands that it is a very difficult situation. He asked that the teachers still consider the zero salary increase for the sake of the entire community and the education system.

There being no further workshop items to be addressed, the Borough Council workshop was adjourned at 8:15 pm.

Councilwoman Patricia Webster was excused from the meeting.

Also present were Borough Clerk-Administrator Kevin Sluka and Borough Attorney Jeremy Solomon.

The pledge of allegiance was recited by those in attendance.

The minutes of the Borough Council meeting for April 5, 2010 were presented in writing for approval. Councilman Utter made a motion and was seconded by Councilwoman Kobuta to approve the minutes as presented. The motion was approved by the following vote:

Councilman Mitchell reported on the upcoming County Redevelopment Forum Workshop in late May.

Councilman Mitchell asked if a flag drop off box could be placed at Borough Hall.

Councilman Utter reported on the recent Annual Fire Fighters Memorial Mass where the Somerville Fire Department received a plaque for their 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Councilwoman Kobuta asked that the Borough Council consider a resolution to support the Main Street New Jersey Program.

### **Open to the Public:**

Mayor Gallagher opened the meeting to comments from the public.

John Kurilla, 77 Eastern Ave, Somerville, commented on the flag retirement. There is also a drop location in Manville at the American Legion.

Mr. Kurilla asked why there was no opportunity for public comments for the school board budget.

Mayor Gallagher asked for any other questions and hearing none he declared the public portion of the meeting to be closed.

ORDINANCE # 2326

ADDING ARTICLE V TO CHAPTER 149 TO BE ENTITLED PRIVATE STORM WATER INLET RETOFITTING

#### SECTION I. Purpose:

An ordinance requiring the retrofitting of existing storm drain inlets which are in direct contact with repaving, repairing, reconstruction, or resurfacing or alterations of facilities on private property, to prevent the discharge of solids and floatables (such as plastic bottles, cans, food wrappers and other litter) to the municipal separate storm sewer system(s) operated by the Borough of Somerville so as to protect public health, safety and welfare, and to prescribe penalties for the failure to comply.

#### SECTION II. Definitions:

For the purpose of this ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words, and their derivations shall have the meanings stated herein unless their use in the text of this Chapter clearly demonstrates a different meaning. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words used in the plural number include the singular number, and words used in the singular number include the plural number. The word “shall” is always mandatory and not merely directory.

- a. Municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4)– a conveyance or system of conveyances (including roads with drainage systems, municipal streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ditches, manmade channels, or storm drains) that is owned or operated by the Borough of Somerville or other public body, and is designed and used for collecting and conveying stormwater.
- b. Person – any individual, corporation, company, partnership, firm, association, or political subdivision of this State subject to municipal jurisdiction.
- c. Storm drain inlet- an opening in a storm drain used to collect stormwater runoff and includes, but is not limited to, a grate inlet, curb-opening inlet, slotted inlet, and combination inlet.
- d. Waters of the State – means the ocean and its estuaries, all springs, streams and bodies of surface or ground water, whether natural or artificial, within the boundaries of the State of New Jersey or subject to its jurisdiction.

### SECTION III. Prohibited Conduct:

No person in control of private property (except a residential lot with one single family house) shall authorize the repaving, repairing (excluding the repair of individual potholes), resurfacing (including top coating or chip sealing with asphalt emulsion or a thin base of hot bitumen), reconstructing or altering any surface that is in direct contact with an existing storm drain inlet on that property unless the storm drain inlet either:

- 1. Already meets the design standard below to control passage of solid and floatable materials; or
- 2. Is retrofitted or replaced to meet the standard in Section V below prior to the completion of the project.

### SECTION V. Design Standard:

Storm drain inlets identified in Section IV above shall comply with the following standard to control passage of solid and floatable materials through storm drain inlets. For purposes of this paragraph, “solid and floatable materials” means sediment, debris, trash, and other floating, suspended, or settleable solids. For exemptions to this standard see Section V.3 below.

- 1. Design engineers shall use either of the following grates whenever they use a grate in pavement or another ground surface to collect stormwater from that surface into a storm drain or surface water body under that grate:
  - a. The New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) bicycle safe grate, which is described in Chapter 2.4 of the NJDOT Bicycle Compatible Roadways and Bikeways Planning and Design Guidelines (April 1996); or
  - b. A different grate, if each individual clear space in that grate has an area of no more than seven (7.0) square inches, or is no greater than 0.5 inches across the smallest dimension. Examples of grates subject to this standard include grates in grate inlets, the grate portion (non-curb-opening portion) of combination inlets, grates on storm sewer manholes, ditch grates, trench grates, and grates of spacer bars in slotted drains. Examples of ground surfaces include surfaces of roads (including bridges), driveways, parking areas, bikeways, plazas, sidewalks, lawns, fields, open channels, and stormwater basin floors.
- 2. Whenever design engineers use a curb-opening inlet, the clear space in that curb opening (or each individual clear space, if the curb opening has two or more clear spaces) shall have an area of no more than seven (7.0) square inches, or be no greater than two (2.0) inches across the smallest dimension.
- 3. This standard does not apply:
  - a. Where the municipal engineer agrees that this standard would cause inadequate hydraulic performance that could not practicably be overcome by using additional or larger storm drain inlets that meet these standards;
  - b. Where flows are conveyed through any device (e.g., end of pipe netting facility, manufactured treatment device, or a catch basin hood) that is designed, at a minimum, to prevent delivery of all solid and floatable materials that could not pass through one of the following:
    - i. A rectangular space four and five-eighths inches long and one and one-half inches wide (this option does not apply for outfall netting facilities); or
    - ii. A bar screen having a bar spacing of 0.5 inches.
  - c. Where flows are conveyed through a trash rack that has parallel bars with one-inch (1”) spacing between the bars; or
  - d. Where the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection determines, pursuant to the New Jersey Register of Historic Places Rules at N.J.A.C. 7:4-7.2(c), that action to meet this standard is an undertaking that constitutes an encroachment or will damage or destroy the New Jersey Register listed historic property.

## SECTION V. Enforcement:

This ordinance shall be enforced by the Borough of Somerville.

## SECTION VI. Penalties:

Any person(s) who is found to be in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$1,000 for each storm drain inlet that is not retrofitted to meet the design standard.

## SECTION VII. Severability:

Each section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase of this Ordinance is declared to be an independent section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase, and the finding or holding of any such portion of this Ordinance to be unconstitutional, void, or ineffective for any cause, or reason, shall not affect any other portion of this Ordinance.

## BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED as follows:

- 1) That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.
- 2) This ordinance shall effect July 1, 2010 upon final publication and adoption in the manner provided by law.

Mayor Gallagher opened the meeting to comments on Ordinance 2326 and there were none at this time.

Councilman Mitchell commented that this does not affect single family homes.

Councilman Mitchell made a motion and was seconded by Councilwoman Kobuta to approve the aforementioned ordinance for adoption. The motion was approved by the following vote:

**ORDINANCE # 2327**

**ADDING ARTICLE V TO CHAPTER 149 TO BE ENTITLED REFUSE CONTAINERS AND DUMPSTERS**

## SECTION I. Purpose:

An ordinance requiring dumpsters and other refuse containers that are outdoors or exposed to stormwater to be covered at all times and prohibits the spilling, dumping, leaking, or otherwise discharge of liquids, semi-liquids or solids from the containers to the municipal separate storm sewer system(s) operated by the Borough of Somerville and/or the waters of the State so as to protect public health, safety and welfare, and to prescribe penalties for the failure to comply.

## SECTION II. Definitions:

For the purpose of this ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words, and their derivations shall have the meanings stated herein unless their use in the text of this Chapter clearly demonstrates a different meaning. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words used in the plural number include the singular number, and words used in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory.

- a. Municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4) – a conveyance or system of conveyances (including roads with drainage systems, municipal streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ditches, manmade channels, or storm drains) that is owned or operated by [insert name of municipality] or other public body, and is designed and used for collecting and conveying stormwater.
- b. Person – any individual, corporation, company, partnership, firm, association, or political subdivision of this State subject to municipal jurisdiction.
- c. Refuse container – any waste container that a person controls whether owned, leased, or operated, including dumpsters, trash cans, garbage pails, and plastic trash bags.
- d. Stormwater – means water resulting from precipitation (including rain and snow) that runs off the land's surface, is transmitted to the subsurface, is captured by separate storm sewers or other sewerage or drainage facilities, or is conveyed by snow removal equipment.

e. Waters of the State – means the ocean and its estuaries, all springs, streams and bodies of surface or ground water, whether natural or artificial, within the boundaries of the State of New Jersey or subject to its jurisdiction.

**SECTION III. Prohibited Conduct:**

Any person who controls, whether owned, leased, or operated, a refuse container or dumpster must ensure that such container or dumpster is covered at all times and shall prevent refuse from spilling out or overflowing. Any person who owns, leases or otherwise uses a refuse container or dumpster must ensure that such container or dumpster does not leak or otherwise discharge liquids, semi-liquids or solids to the municipal separate storm sewer system(s) operated by the Borough of Somerville.

**SECTION IV. Exceptions to Prohibition:**

- a. Permitted temporary demolition containers
- b. Litter receptacles (other than dumpsters or other bulk containers)
- c. Individual homeowner trash and recycling containers
- d. Refuse containers at facilities authorized to discharge stormwater associated with industrial activity under a valid NJPDES permit
- e. Large bulky items (e.g., furniture, bound carpet and padding, white goods placed curbside for pickup)

**SECTION V. Enforcement:**

This ordinance shall be enforced by the Borough of Somerville.

**SECTION VI. Penalties:**

Any person(s) who is found to be in violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$1,000.

**SECTION VII. Severability:**

Each section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase of this Ordinance is declared to be an independent section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase, and the finding or holding of any such portion of this Ordinance to be unconstitutional, void, or ineffective for any cause, or reason, shall not affect any other portion of this Ordinance.

**BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED** as follows:

- 1) That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.
- 2) This ordinance shall effect July 1, 2010 upon final publication and adoption in the manner provided by law.
